# MASTER OF ARTS IN POLITICAL SCIENCE

Offering insight into politics at the local, state, national and international level

#### **GENERAL INFORMATION**

The Master of Arts in Political Science at IUPUI provides students with the opportunity to study the forces and institutions that shape and drive politics and government at the local, state, national and international level.

Students enrolled in the M.A. program will be able to study executives, legislatures, judiciaries, state and urban government, parties and interest groups, and will be able to make comparisons in government across different countries, and study international relations. Students benefit from working with faculty with a strong national and international reputation in all these topics.

The program is designed to prepare students for professional development through a mix of academic training and the teaching of valuable research and study skills. Classes are small, offer plenty of faculty-student interaction, and the program is designed to meet the needs of students working full-time.

#### **CAREERS**

Employment options for our graduates include working in government, non-governmental organizations, think-tanks, private corporations, political party organizations, political campaigns, and professional lobbying organizations. Some graduates complete further study at PhD granting institutions or earn law degrees.

## Internship

(3-6 credit hours/1-2 courses)

Students also have the option of completing an internship with a state, local or urban government institution, or with an organization having operational ties with such an institution. Students enroll in POLS Y881-Internship in Political Science.

# ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

Minimum admissions requirements are a B.A. from an accredited institution, a GPA of at least 3.0 and minimum scores on the revised GRE General Test of 145 in each of the verbal and quantitative elements, and 4.5 in the analytical writing element.

Students must also have a research skill, consisting either of reading knowledge of a foreign language (to be indicated by completion of a second-year undergraduate equivalent course, or by testing out in an approved examination) or proficiency in quantitative research skills (to be indicated by completion of

an advanced research methods graduate course in political science or another approved discipline.

Applications for admission to the program (without financial support) will be reviewed throughout the year, but students are encouraged to apply by May 1 for Fall admission and November 1 for Spring admission.

Applications (including GRE scores) for IUPUI Fellowships must be submitted by February 1. Priority for other forms of financial aid (internships, research assistantships, teaching assistantships) will be given to those applying by May 1.

Applicants should submit the following:

- A completed application for the IU Graduate School
- Official transcripts from all previous relevant college/university work
- GRE scores
- Three letters of recommendation
